### APRA/PPNZ

Australasian Performing Rights Association Phonographic Performances New Zealand

New Zealand copyright law makes songwriters and composers the exclusive owners of their original music and lyrics. Nobody else can use their work without getting their permission first, and if necessary, paying a royalty for this use. This is where APRA steps in. <a href="https://www.apra.co.nz">www.apra.co.nz</a> APRA is a not-forprofit organisation that collects royalties on behalf of its 50,000 members including over 6,000 New Zealand members, and by agreement, for all the copyright owners around the world.

In the past NZTF had an arrangement with APRA to cover our members for the use of overture, entrance and exit music but things have changed and we no longer have this cover. Negotiations with them are being undertaken.

In the meantime PPNZ www.ppnz.co.nz have approached us and talks with them are in progress. PPNZ, also a not-for-profit organisation, administers the rights of local and international record labels and recording artists in the New Zealand territory. They are responsible for licensing and collecting income from the broadcasting and public performance of sound of the rights owners it represents; distributing this income back to them.

What does this mean for theatre groups? Foyer music in a theatre or venue should require two licences, one from APRA, which covers the artist/composer and one from PPNZ which covers the use of the recording. The licences are the responsibility of the venue owner and an annual fee should be paid to both APRA and PPNZ to cover this.

For music played as part of a performance — including entr'acte music - it would appear that again two licences are needed, one from APRA and one from PPNZ — these have to be applied for by the group putting on the play and for each production. There is no annual fee. NZTF is making representation to these bodies for a simplified system.

### Planning for a Weekend Workshop

Adrienne Hurley of Napier Repertory writes

Holding an acting workshop weekend is one of the best things you can do for your society. It will inject new ideas, give your actors a chance to step outside their comfort zone and generally enrich everyone, especially in their confidence and ability to perform.

Napier Rep has run three workshops over the last three years. We have had two acting workshops with Bryan Aitken and a directing workshop with Nanette Wright.

Here's a summary of the process:

- 1. Canvas members and local societies for interest.
- 2. Choose tutor and arrange weekend date.
- 3. Arrange suitable venue
- 4. Send out application forms for the course.
- 5. Find sponsors for tutor's accommodation, airfares and other expenses
- 6. Ensure there is someone to help over the weekend eg make tea, provide food.

And here are some extra notes on weekend workshops adapted by the editor from a 1980 Federation newsletter:

- 1. When advertising make sure you include a lively resume of what the course will involve as well as comment about the tutor and his qualifications.
- 2. Get the fees from participants before they arrive. This gives you a surer idea of numbers and almost guarantees attendance.
- 3. Point out that a weekend school is just that and people who cannot attend all sessions would be better not to come at all.
- Make the venue as attractive as possible. The hall should be warm and clean for each session. Cups should be washed and needs of tutor and participants met satisfactorily.
- 5. Provision of good technical requirements eg CD player (in 1980 it was a record player!).
- 6. Make everything ready before first session.
- 7. It is not only courteous to introduce the tutor officially to the group it is good 'theatre'.
- 8. Prepare name tags for everyone, organisers too.
- 9. Establish tutor's accommodation preference -

billeting, motel, hotel

- 10. Settle the final timetable for the course before the tutor arrives so the class and those left at home know when to expect meal breaks.
- 11. It is a good idea for those running the school to see it in terms of a production, with the tutor as the director, the class as the cast and (perhaps most important) with the committee acting as an efficient backstage crew. The committee's work is not finished once the idea for the course has been set in motion. The group needs to analyse carefully its motive for the workshop, what they hope to achieve, to publicise this effectively to members, and to ensure that all has been done to help the tutor make the workshop a success.
- 12. After the event a full report needs to be sent to sponsors and the tutor. The tutor needs feedback on success or failure so his/her work can be tailored to the next venture.

Finally, Adrienne says "Have a fantastic weekend!"

### South Otago Theatrical Society

Information supplied by Stephanie Bowden

The South Otago Theatrical Society is located in Balclutha on the banks of the mighty Clutha River. Membership comes from the town and surrounding rural areas of Waihola, Milton and Owaka, Clinton, Clydevale and Lawrence.

The Society evolved from the Balclutha Drama Club 1936 and the 1966 South Otago Musical Society. In 1968 these two groups merged to form a society that has continued to perform plays, music hall, pantomimes, theatre restaurant as well as large scale musicals.

The original rehearsal rooms were at separate times an old house and Tearooms. In 1987 a Trader/Joinery building was purchased and over the years this has been converted into a good space for rehearsals, intimate theatre, set and property storage with kitchen facilities. Another building was brought on site and with many hours of devoted labour from members, now proudly houses our extensive wardrobe.

Our annual programme usually involves one-act plays, with a play/comedy/theatre restaurant production at the end of the year and on alternate years a major musical held in the Balclutha Memorial Hall. Last year the plays *STiFF* and *Dad's Army* were very well received and we also made national news coverage joining with the local Historical Society to re-enact the notorious 'Amy Bock' story. This was part of a series of commemorative events marking 100 years since the trickster Amy posed as 'Percy' to marry local girl Agnes Ottoway to make off with her fortune. Needless to say he/she was found out, but after the wedding took place!

Over the years SOTS has enjoyed a long involvement with the NZTF Festival of Community Theatre, having had plays reach regional and national finals.

Our adult membership is around 80 with children being included as the need arises. We will be running a workshop-style week in the July holidays for school students with drama, dance and singing, working towards public performances.

We have just concluded five successful performances of *The Importance of Being Earnest* by Oscar Wilde.





Another premiere is scheduled at **Napier Repertory Players** at the beginning of July. A British prize winning play *Let It Be Me* by Carey Jane Hardy will have its
New Zealand Premiere at the beginning of July. Timed to precede Alzheimer's Awareness Week the play concerns a woman's devotion to her aunt whose memories are slowly being lost. Director Anne Corney is working closely with the Alzheimer Society to ensure that the content of the play is treated sensitively and with respect and dignity.

Pahiatua Repertory Society have an innovative approach to subscriptions. It was decided at the AGM that for 2010 they will set membership fees at \$1 per year. Yes that's \$1, not a typo. Subscriptions are now due, and invoices will be sent out soon (including the option to pay online). They welcome the dollar but are also offering the opportunity to make a donation to the Society at the same time.

Hawera Repertory Society is mounting *Oliver* next month. They aim to sell 4,000 seats in a town of less than 8,000. That's the equivalent of 500.000 Aucklanders buying tickets for a show.

### A Theatre is a Dangerous Place

Barry Lakeman was once told that "if you want to kill someone or commit suicide, it is easiest in a theatre when rigging or de-rigging".

A document that should be read by everyone involved in theatre is The Guide For Safe Working Practices, a new version of which has just been released. The guide was prepared by a committee of Stephen Blackburn (Capital E National Theatre for Children), Phil Conroy (Shand Shelton), Nick Kyle (Royal NZ Ballet). Rob Peters (Theatre Systems & Design Ltd) with the assistance of Alan Barrett of the Department of Labour.

It is especially relevant when one considers that the Health and Safety Act covers volunteer workers, even if they are not involved in a commercial enterprise, that audiences are deemed to be employees under the act, and that heavy fines and imprisonment can be imposed on incorporated amateur societies and their officials if accidents occur because safety standards are not adhered to.

The guide covers such areas as general risk & hazard management, Front of House responsibilities, fire safety and retardance, working at heights (including use of scaffolds and ladders) and in the performance space, set construction, lighting and electrical, noise/sound, wardrobe, productions using children and animals, the use of items (such as lasers, firearms, weapons, pyrotechnics, dry ice and smoke effects), and contains a handy "Theatre Health & Safety Check List".






