# Results of TheatreFest'13 Survey

Special thanks to directors, cast, and crew who responded to the survey. Your feedback was very much appreciated, with most of the comments showing Theatre New Zealand in a positive light. All but one group would recommend other theatre societies or schools to enter the TheatreFest.

Director's positive comments included:

- The chance to see different plays and performances
- It was a lot of fun and I learnt a lot from the process and the adjudication.
- I enjoyed working on a play of my choice and being able to stage it with my own vision.
- Getting to meet other Directors and groups and seeing what other people are doing.

The main negative feedback related to the adjudication process. ANZDA will look into this.

Thanks also for the response from Organisers. All but one would recommend other theatre societies or schools to host a TheatreFest. All organisers felt they were well supported by Theatre New Zealand National Executive and all organisers received all relevant information.

Organiser's positive comments included:

- Great way to network with others and to see the types of theatre being performed by others and also a great learning opportunity.
- Meeting people from visiting societies, learning how others interpret scripts etc. Pulling together as an efficient team from our theatre. Appreciation by others of our venue/tech people etc. We had fun!!

#### RIVERSIDE DRIVE by Graeme Tetley (large cast)

We're thrilled to now represent this script: It's the 1950s and New Zealand teenagers are beginning to discover sex and rock and roll. The adults are not impressed, and 15 year olds David and Rosa are right in the middle of it all. The hit of the 2011 Wanaka Festival. '...funny, shocking, nostalgic and tender.' THEATREVIEW

#### TIGERPLAY by Gary Henderson (2w 3m)

Russ wants more in his life than the mail-order steak knives that have just arrived, or visiting the tiger in the zoo again. When he sees his new flatmate's tiger tattoo he may well have found his obsession.

#### **COW** by Jo Randerson (5w 5m)

All Beth wants to do is make a cow out of leaves, but her efforts are thwarted by, amongst others, a father who thinks he's a cat, an interfering yuppie couple and a loud American tourist. Black comedy on the farm.

#### **AWESOME FOURSOME** by Bevin Linkhorn (2w 3m)

Four students with very particular character traits are set to complete a group assignment that turns out to be much bigger than any of them had suspected. An apocalyptic comedy with extraordinary final assessment. Suitable for senior secondary school students.

#### THE RISING SCONE by Mel Johnston (3w 1m)

Four young people mount a scone race in an effort to put their small town on the map. The race is on, but the battle for places is soon overshadowed by something ... er ... bigger.

#### **ARCADIAN NIGHTS** by Philip Braithwaite (3w 5m)

Welcome to Arcadia, a dark and tragic island where the inhabitants speak a little funny and the challenge has begun; just how far would you go to preserve the ideals you think you live within. *Arcadian Nights* is a fairytale from hell. If you go down to the woods tonight you might just not come back.

**SAPAI AND THE YAM SNATCHERS** by Michelanne Forster and Leilani Unasa (large cast)

Samoa is plagued by the Alele, a gang of winged thieves who fly from island to island stealing all the food and whatever else they can lay their hands on. When they steal all of Chief Tuisamata's yams his eldest grandson, Sapai, embarks on a quest to rid Samoa of the Alele and return the yams. A quest that will take him to the Underworld and back.

# ATLAS/MOUNTAINS/DEAD BUTTERFLIES by Joseph Harper (1-3w 5m)

Rhys and Phoebe live together at 10 Stencil Terrace, where their tap is dripping. Rhys wants to do something. Phoebe doesn't. Together and apart, they're shaken into action/inaction as Atlas buckles under the weight of the world. Activists, statues, plumbers, and hundreds of millions of dead butterflies fall into our lives as we wait for it to snow, and the taps go drip, drip, drip.

#### **ELOISE IN THE MIDDLE** by Emily Duncan (1w)

Eloise is a seven-year-old girl who has an poignant adventure when she visits her father, travelling on her own for the first time, and then meeting for the first time her dad's girlfriend. Winner of the 2013 Plays for the Young Competition (3 – 8 year olds).

#### SPACE CIRCUS by Holly Gooch (large cast)

An interactive circus play for up to two hundred 5-8 year olds who collectively explore what is out there in space, they boldly go where no child has gone before! Winner of the 2013 Plays for the Young Competition (3 – 8 year olds).

#### A STORY OF RONA by Stephanie Matuku (large cast)

Rona is renowned for her insulting manner toward her family and the village is sick of her so her rival, Kira, decides to hire a Taniwha to get rid of her. A prequel to the classic legend of Rona and the Moon. Winner of the 2013 Plays for the Young Competition (8 – 12 year olds).

#### THE WAYFINDER by Joey Moncarz (large cast)

A rebellious Auckland teenager is sent to live with an uncle in the Islands and there disturbs the locals when he learns what they say he shouldn't learn. Winner of the 2013 Plays for the Young Competition (Teenagers).

# Kapiti Playhouse Attracts Sixteen New Members In a Day

We held an Open Day on Labour Weekend Sunday, and the Wednesday beforehand we had a full page ad in the local paper, which included a write-up and 3 good photos from our archives. The ad emphasised the fact that we were looking for more people to get involved, as we were short on manpower, and it listed the areas in which they might be interested. Most people who came along said they knew about the day because they had seen the ad. We had three of our sponsors help us out with the cost, with their own ads along the bottom of the page. (If we had had more time, we would also have put posters up around the local shopping areas).

We had the theatre half set up with our usual table

seating, and down the middle put a couple of trestle tables with photo albums of past shows, dating right back to our early days. We also had posters of past shows on the walls. We borrowed mannequins, which we dressed in interesting costumes from the wardrobe, and placed around the theatre. In the dressing room we had wigs, hats and our makeup boxes on display.

Committee members greeted people, told them about the theatre, and took them on tours backstage. This worked really well, as each person or small group had their own personal tour guide. Set-building was also going on for an upcoming show, another point of interest for visitors.

In the foyer we provided tea, coffee and biscuits, and had a membership table set up, with forms available for people to either fill in or take away with them.

We have gained 16 new members, some of whom have had lots of experience in other theatres. Our skills database is now looking stronger, and we also have lots of new members who are keen to learn and help out.
