### President

**Governance:** the action of governing; Conduct the policy and affairs of an organisation; Govern (pilot); Exercise of authority; Management.

The word governance has cropped up a lot lately – whether to do with the Christchurch rebuild and restoration of societies and their theatres – or to do with separate issues surrounding the planning, management and programming of individual societies around the country. People come to us with all sorts of problems, seeking advice and assistance.

From the feedback I have received recently it would appear that some memberships are having trouble with their committees, or that is the perception – whether this is a lack of transparent operation, clear-headedness when dealing with issues, or the pushing through of 'personal agendas'.

Some societies we have discovered, also don't seem to have rules of limited tenure on their committees to enable timely inter-change of personnel. This can create a feeling of disenfranchisement within some groups; a 'holding on of power' it is felt. It can also have the adverse effect of stultifying growth, inhibiting vision and generally creating lethargy and ill-will amongst the membership. But, we also recognise that the disparity between people willing to stand for committee and those with actual administrative ability can sometimes be wide.

So, is your constitution working – is it fair? Some constitutions I have discovered have a clause that states one third of the committee must step down after three or four years consecutive service, and remain off for one year before seeking re-election. This creates a rotation and ensures two things – that committee experience is not totally lost with change, whilst some new ideas can be moderated into the pool. New members can gain the valuable experience of balancing the process of mounting productions with running the affairs of the society.

If there is a lack of interest of serving within your society, try a 'buddy' system whereby senior executive members 'shoulder-tap' someone to walk beside them for a year – or try a series of small sub-committees formed under executive members, to create a stimulus within the group which then feeds back into the main committee – this can involve; play/musical selection, design, promotion, any department you care to name really. It doesn't take much time at all for the enthusiasm to rise and the feeling that membership isn't just about taking the subs! The stronger the participation with-in your society – the stronger your society will become.

Have a great summer break and try expanding the horizon of your society in the New Year!
