### New to National Executive

Kia ora from the deep south! I'm Hannah, TNZ representative for Southland. I'm passionate about theatre, and so pleased to be involved in Theatre New Zealand. It took a while (and getting more involved in different productions) before I finally did hear about it, just last year, when I was persuaded to give directing a go. I'm so glad I did. My experience and the feedback I got as a new director was invaluable. I wish I'd known about it sooner!

It got me to thinking how we can better market ourselves and how we can connect with our communities. It would be fantastic if anyone who was keen to give the boards a tread could use TNZ and TheatreFest as a resource to help get them

there. They can of course, but not if they don't hear about it. I'm not saying it's not for lack of trying - I expect our members are all involved in TNZ for the same sorts of reasons. We all love what we do, and want to share that with our communities. I simply hope that we can continue efforts to spread the net and get the word out there, reaching anyone and everyone who might be interested. TheatreFest is such a fantastic opportunity to reach a wide and potentially new group of theatre lovers. It's a great way for people to get involved and hopefully, through it, connect with their community theatre groups.

So here's to TheatreFest 2017. With any luck it will be as full of "newbies" as "old hats", and our New Zealand community theatre whānau can continue to grow, diversify and

strengthen our local and national ties. After all, isn't that what it's all about?

## New Zealand Theatre Month September 2018 Celebrating and Elevating New Zealand Theatre

Theatre New Zealand is very enthusiastic to support New Zealand Theatre month in September next year. We recognise and endorse that the aim is to support the performance of work originating in New Zealand.

This special month is timed to coincide with our National Final of TheatreFest 2018 and we will acknowledge works of New Zealand Theatre in our programme. We already have an award for Best Production of a New Zealand play in our category listings, named in honour of Past National President and playwright, Denise Walsh.

We encourage members to consider productions of New Zealand origin for performance from 1 – 31 September 2018. Those that select a 'New Zealand' work will be duly recognised and supported in the New Zealand Month. It is however each group's decision to self-select to be part of Theatre New Zealand Month or not. And we will continue to encourage entries in TheatreFest written by other playwrights, Shakespeare excerpts via the Sheilah Wynn festival for example.

## Comment from Bronwyn Elsmore, Playwrights Association of New Zealand (PANZ)

Back in 2003 a Playwrights Association of New Zealand initiative was "Year of the New Zealand Play". The committee put a lot of time into organizing this. We gained the support of Creative NZ, Playmarket, and Play Bureau all of which helped us publicize it, but Playwrights Association did, and were happy to do, the great part of the work.

In advance of the year, we wrote to theatres around the country urging them to include NZ plays in their seasons – in those days it was a great rarity to see ourselves portrayed on stage! We offered certificates of appreciation to all who joined in the challenge. Quite a few theatre groups took it up, and received these. I sent them out and recall that some theatres, including Centrepoint Theatre in Palmerston North, displayed theirs proudly in their foyers.

PANZ President Peter Thomas included this paragraph in his report for the year —
"...in this Year of the New Zealand Play we have made positive progress.... The Year of the
New Zealand Play...has been an unqualified success. I can say this with confidence as we have
received numerous letters of support and requests to do it again."

The competition judge's (Brian Staniland – ANZDA- ed) report for the year includes – "This is the Year of the New Zealand Play, and it was heartening to see that of all the entries, a good number of you rose to the challenge to come up with a distinctly New Zealand theme."

The good news is that the NZ theatre scene has altered since 2003. I like to think that Year of the New Zealand Play can take some of the credit for pushing along the change in attitude.
